

Artistic Director's Note

Music of the Sistine Chapel was programed under the notion that historical performance context aids in understanding and appreciating music of previous centuries. Placing music in the setting for which it was intended more fully reveals the beauty and intent of those centuries' greatest compositions. To provide context for the polyphonic works and chant, I have chosen to perform all the musical elements of a complete Mass, and because it falls on the same weekend as these performances, I've chosen as our musical structure a Mass for the 3rd Sunday of Epiphany.

Planning a performance of music of the Sistine Chapel took me first to the manuscripts. The Chapel didn't have its own printing press and so did not publish its own editions of music, however numerous scores were copied by hand into choirbooks. A study of these manuscripts uncovers what music was performed by the Sistine Chapel Choir for Papal functions. The following works are all found in the Chapel choirbooks.

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina's (c.1525-1594) best-known work, Missa Papae Marcelli (Pope Marcellus Mass), provides the bulk of the polyphonic works on this program. Composed around 1563, the work was hailed in its own day as well as now as the supreme achievement of late-Renaissance polyphony. It was so popular that it has been sung at every Papal Coronation since its conception to the present day.

The two other polyphonic works on the program are motets. The first is Ave Maria...Virgo Serena by Josquin des Prez (c.1440-1521), a composer of Franco-Burgundian birth, who lived for many years in Rome and sang in the Sistine Chapel Choir. Josquin is considered the greatest composer of the high-Renaissance, the half-century which precedes Palestrina. Ave Maria...Virgo Serena begins with the familiar Ave Maria text, but then shifts to include five poetic stanzas, each highlighting a meaningful aspect of Mary's life: Conception, Nativity, Annunciation, Purification, and Assumption. Following those strophes is the final and most arresting phrase of the work, a personal petition—"O mother of God, remember me." The final polyphonic work of the program is Palestrina's most famous motet, Sicut Cervus. The text, taken from Psalm 42, likens a deer's longing for a water brook to humankind's longing for God. With water as the central imagery, the motet is unsurprisingly sung for baptisms on Holy Saturday, the night which precedes Easter.

Gregorian Chant, the third musical element in the program, has been the primary musical material for Catholic worship for nearly two millennia and is still used in many Catholic churches today. My chant study has been focused on the area of performance practice, specifically in rhythmic performance. 1,000 years ago chant melodies were learned orally and memorized, but as the repertory grew, the need to be reminded of the rhythms led to the development of adiastematic neumes, or neumes that are written without the aid of staff lines to represent intervallic relationship. The decades-old research area of semiology, the study of signs, has revealed a complex and nuanced rhythmic notation used by monks prior to the invention of staff line notation in the 13th-century. These ancient neumes, seen in your program on page 4, look like a series of lines, loops, and squiggles written above the text, and they reveal a vast world of rhythmic complexity and specificity. Te Deum singers have learned to read these neumes found in a 10th century manuscript from the Benedictine Abbey of Einsiedeln, Switzerland, and are performing today with this rhythmic interpretation. — MCS

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Artistic Director

Matthew Christopher Shepard is a professional conductor, church musician, and guest lecturer. His unique career path has led him to concert halls conducting both professional orchestras and choirs, to collegiate and secondary school classrooms to guest conduct and lecture in musicology, and to communities of faith to lead both Christian and Jewish worship services. His intellectual curiosity, fearless programming, and magnetic leadership has made him one of the most sought-after conductors in the region.

Mr. Shepard is founder and conductor of Te Deum, which has established itself as one of the premier choral ensembles in the region. He is frequently engaged as a conducting clinician, most recently with the American Choral Director's Association Kansas State Convention Honor Choir. With his growing reputation in the Early Music field, Mr. Shepard's work and contributions to the field have twice been featured in the publication *Early Music America*, and has presented lectures on historical chant performance, music history and performance practice. With Te Deum he has given period performances of great pillars of baroque music including Buxtehude's Membra Jesu Nostri, J.S. Bach's St. John Passion, and Bach's B-Minor Mass.

As an orchestral conductor, Mr. Shepard has conducted several ensembles in the area, including The Philharmonia of Greater Kansas City, the Kansas City Civic Orchestra, and the Kansas City Baroque. He has also served as orchestra director at Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas. In the summer of 2018 he was invited to conduct the closing orchestral concert of the American Guild of Organists National Convention in Helzberg Hall at the Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts.

Beginning his musical studies in woodwinds and voice, Mr. Shepard holds an undergraduate degree from William Jewell College, two master's degrees, studying both choral and orchestral conducting at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance, and is pursing Doctoral studies at the University of Illinois where he concurrently holds a teaching assistantship. Mr. Shepard has had additional conducting study as a fellow at the Conductors Institute at Bard College Conservatory under Maestro Leon Botstein and at the Oregon Bach Festival Composers Institute.



Tom Assel studied vocal technique with Dr. Stephen Weber at Amarillo College, Texas. Tom earned a Bachelor of Science in electrical and computer engineering and a master's degree in electrical engineering from the School of Computing and Engineering at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. While there, he sang in the Conservatory Concert Choir under the direction of Dr. Charles Robinson, and University Singers under the direction of Dr. Ryan Board. He and his wife Julie own and operate Assel Grant Services, a grant consulting firm specializing in grant research and proposal writing in a variety of fields. Tom has been singing with Te Deum since fall 2010.

Dr. Andrew Childs has served as Associate Dean and Professor of Music at St. Mary's College since 2008. Previously, he taught at Missouri State University, the Yale University School of Drama, the Thames Valley Music School at Connecticut College, and served as Managing Coordinator of the Department of Voice and Opera at the Yale School of Music. He earned his Bachelor of Music Degree from UC Irvine, and his DMA from the University of Washington. Andrew has sung nearly thirty operatic roles for Seattle Opera, Glimmerglass Opera, Harrisburg Opera, The Center for Contemporary Opera, Amato Opera, and Springfield Opera among others. He has recorded for the Parma, Albany, Koch, and Centaur labels. The American Record Guide wrote of his 2006 solo disc of Charles Ives songs on Centaur, "...there is no better recording by a tenor."

Krista Childs earned both her Bachelor of Music in Education and Master of Music degrees at Missouri State University, where she sang for five years under the direction of Dr. Guy Webb. A native of Sedalia, Missouri, Krista specializes in early childhood music education and is a certified Kodaly instructor. She has extensive experience as a choral conductor and singer in liturgical, educational, and professional settings. She conducted the Children's Chorus of Southwest Missouri and taught previously in the Bolivar R-1 school district, and St. Mary's Academy. She currently teaches at McEachron elementary school in Topeka. She and husband Andrew are proud parents of Sara, Patrick, Rebecca, Zachary, and Paul.

Peggy Chilson is a versatile vocalist who is pleased to be singing for her third project with Te Deum Antiqua. It was with Terri Teal and the Fine Arts Chorale that first instilled and nurtured her love of early sacred music. Currently Peggy's ensemble work includes Geoffrey Wilcken's SongFlower Chorale and a cappella vocal jazz group NightShade, as well as Madrigalia Bar None and Carolers of Note. After returning to Kansas City, Andrew joined Te Deum Chamber Choir and has sung with several other ensembles including Te Deum Antiqua and Kantorei of Kansas City, while also remaining active in music at Atonement Lutheran Church. Andrew received a Master of Business Administration from Rockhurst University in 2016 and spends his days working as a Loan Officer on The Rome Team at Fairway Independent Mortgage Corporation.

Jon Duncan is in his 9th season singing with Te Deum, and is thrilled to serve as the new Assistant Rehearsal Director. Jon is the choir director at Shawnee Mission South High School in Overland Park, Kansas, and he previously taught at Indian Woods Middle School and Hocker Grove Middle School. Jon received his BME and MME both from the UMKC Conservatory. His teachers have included Charles Robinson, Ryan Board, Aidan Soder, Raymond Feener, Joseph Parisi, Dwayne Dunn, Elise Peterson, Erin Smith, Kathy Bhat, and Karen Flaschar. Outside of choral music, Jon enjoys taking care of his houseplants, raising Pokémon, completing puzzles of all genres, and enjoying the KC foodie scene with his partner Luke.

Hunter Eisenmenger is excited to continue with Te Deum as a tenor. He holds a Bachelor of Music Education from Benedictine College, studying voice under Dr. Kristin Newbegin. For three years, he taught high school music in Lee's Summit, Missouri. Currently, he is pursuing a master's degree in vocal performance at the UMKC Conservatory. At the Conservatory, he is studying voice under the tutelage of Weston Hurt, and will be playing the role of Acis in Handel's Acis and Galatea. Rafael Rodriguez is thrilled to join Te Deum in his first season. A chorister for most of his life, Rafael originally hails from New York and brings a strong passion for sacred music. Rafael developed his musical skill and knowledge further starting in 2012 where he attended Saint Mary's College in Kansas and sang under the direction of Dr. Andrew Childs for over 8 years. While living in the Manhattan, Kansas area, Rafael also sang several seasons with Collegium Musicum at Kansas State University led by Dr. David Wood, and the Masterworks Chorale led by Dr. Jeffrey Ward. Since then, he has become a valuable member of the St. Vincent de Paul Church community where he directs the schola, sings in the choir, and teaches Gregorian chant to the high school students of St. Vincent's Academy.

Bryan Waznik is a student in the M.M. in Choral Conducting program at UMKC. He comes to Kansas City from Minnesota, where he spent the last 4 years teaching vocal music at Zimmerman Middle/High School in Zimmerman, MN. Along with his regular teaching engagements, he has also served as a section coach for the Minnesota All-State Choirs, and maintains an active career as a performer. As a Tenor, Bryan has performed with MPLS (imPulse) and The Singers: MCA, and has had the opportunity to present a number of new works and masterworks around the Twin Cities. Bryan holds a B.A. in Music from Luther College (2015).

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
