





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Matthew Christopher Shepard is a professional conductor, church musician, and guest lecturer based in Kansas City. His unique career path has led him to concert halls conducting both professional orchestras and choirs, to collegiate and secondary school classrooms to guest conduct and lecture in musicology, and to communities of faith to lead both Christian and Jewish worship services. His intellectual curiosity, fearless programming, and magnetic leadership has made him one of the most sought-after conductors in the region.

Mr. Shepard is founder and conductor of Te Deum, and its early music ensemble, Te Deum Antiqua. Now in its 12th season, Te Deum has established itself as one of the premier choral ensembles in the region. He is frequently engaged as a conducting clinician, most recently with the University of Kansas and MidAmerica Nazarene University, and in the summer of 2020 will be the director of the American Choral Director's Association Kansas State Convention Honor Choir. With his growing reputation in the Early Music field, Mr. Shepard's work and contributions to the field were featured in Early Music America, both in a highlight article in their electronic publication, and in a featured article in their monthly magazine. He has also been a recent guest lecturer in music history and performance practice at William Jewell College and Baker University. With Te Deum he has given period performances of great pillars of baroque music including Buxtehude's Membra Jesu Nostri, J.S. Bach's St. John Passion, and Bach's B-Minor Mass.

As an orchestral conductor, Mr. Shepard has conducted several ensembles in the area, including The Philharmonia of Greater Kansas City, the Kansas City Civic Orchestra, and the Kansas City Baroque. He has also served as orchestra director at Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas. In the summer of 2018 he was invited to conduct the closing orchestral concert at the National Convention of the American Guild of Organists in Helzberg Hall at the Kauffman Center for the Performance Arts.

Mr. Shepard also serves as the associate director of music at Village Presbyterian Church in Prairie Village, Kansas, where he leads adult choral and instrumental ensembles and directs their youth choir. Beginning his musical studies in woodwinds and voice, Mr. Shepard holds an undergraduate degree from William Jewell College and two master's degrees, studying both choral and orchestral conducting at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance. He has also studied as a fellow at the Conductors Institute at Bard College Conservatory and at the Oregon Bach Festival Composers Institute.

Suzanne Anderson, praised for her "ecstatic virtuosity" (Huffington Post) and for providing "notable grace" (Los Angeles Times), she has performed in the New York, London, and Los Angeles metro areas with numerous professional ensembles including the Los Angeles Master Chorale, Bach Collegium San Diego, Millennium Consort Singers, Voices of Ascension and the Choir of Trinity Wall Street. A frequent collaborator in early music ventures, she has performed Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610 oneon-a-part under the direction of Stephen Stubbs, sung in multiple productions of Hildegard von Bingen's Ordo Virtutem and traveled to Hungary for a series of recitals featuring selections from Barbara Strozzi's Opus 6. Ms. Anderson holds degrees from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London and Westminster Choir College. She currently teaches privately at the Lydia Lovan Community School of Music at William Jewell College and is the director of music at Immanuel Lutheran Church.

Tom Assel studied vocal technique with Dr. Stephen Weber at Amarillo College, Texas. Tom earned a Bachelor of Science in electrical and computer engineering and a master's degree in electrical engineering from the School of Computing and Engineering at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. While there, he sang in the Conservatory Concert Choir under the direction of Dr. Charles Robinson, and University Singers under the direction of Dr. Ryan Board. He and his wife Julie own and operate Assel Consulting LLC, a grant consulting firm specializing in grant research and proposal writing in a variety of fields. Tom has been singing with Te Deum since fall 2010.

Peggy Chilson is a versatile vocalist and pleased to be singing for her first project with Te Deum Antiqua. It was with Terri Teal and the Fine Arts Chorale that first instilled and nurtured her love of early sacred music. Currently Peggy's ensemble work is with the SongFlower Chorale and Madrigalia Bar None. As a solo performer, Peggy can be heard around town headlining her own jazz trio, sitting in with Moon City Big Band or as a soloist at Unity Churches. When she is not creating music, Peggy is a clinical therapist and parent of a precocious 15 year-old trombone player.

Andrew Cunard graduated in 2010 with a business degree from Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa. While there, he sang in several premier groups including the Wartburg Choir where he grew as a choral singer under the direction of Dr. Paul Torkelson, Dr. Weston Noble, and current director Dr. Lee Nelson. After returning to Kansas City, Andrew joined Te Deum Chamber Choir and has sung with several other ensembles including Te Deum Antiqua and Kantorei of Kansas City, while also remaining active in music at Atonement Lutheran Church. Andrew received a Master of Business Administration from Rockhurst University in 2016 and spends his days working as a Loan Officer on The Rome Team at Fairway Independent Mortgage Corporation. Jonathan Daniel is an emerging composer and bass-baritone, amateur pianist, and aspiring writer based in Kansas City. As a queer man of color and secularist, he is passionate about using his music and writing to speak from a broadly humanist perspective and give voice to the LGBTQ+ community and other marginalized groups. This will be his first season with Te Deum as well Kantorei KC. He was a Choral Scholar at William Jewell College, graduating in 2019 with a Bachelor of Arts in Oxbridge Music and Philosophy. While at William Jewell he toured internationally and recorded multiple albums with its award-winning Concert Choir. He currently sings with KC VITAS Chamber Choir and the St. George's Choral Scholars of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, and has previously sung with Songflower Chorale, the AGOGKC Schola Cantorum.

Joanna Ehlers, Kansas City native, is a graduate of the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance, where she earned both bachelor and master degrees in vocal performance. She has performed with the Lyric Opera of Kansas City, the Ancora Chorale, KC VITAs Chamber Choir, Te Deum Chamber Choir, Antiqua and Landlocked Opera Inc. Future engagements include the Kansas City Chorale and Cardinalis. Joanna is a founding member of Ignea Strata and serves as a choral scholar at historic St. Mary's Episcopal Church in downtown Kansas City. She resides in Independence, Missouri, with her family.

Christopher Fuelling is a theatre director, tenor, and recent transplant to Kansas City, the new headquarters of his company Teatro Korazon. After earning a Bachelor of Arts in anthropology at Princeton and a Master of Fine Arts from CalArts in opera directing and vocal performance, he performed with Los Angeles Master Chorale and Long Beach Opera. A Beebe Foundation Fellowship to study Baroque Voice brought him to Amsterdam to study with Max von Egmond and Peter Kooy, where he also joined Daniel Reuss' Cappella Amsterdam. Over the next 12 years in Europe, he worked as a soloist and chorister specializing in Gregorian Chant with Eugeen Liven d'Abelardo's Hartkeriana and in 17th Century music, touring with Gabriel Garrido's Ensemble Elyma and co-founding Cappella Confluentes in Koblenz. As a theatre director he has created liturgical reconstructions and new works of ritual, immersive, and musical theatre on three continents, from Bali to Burning Man.

Michael Hon is a Kansas City-based baritone, performing in various ensembles and solo engagements across the city. Michael received a degree in business administration from William Jewell College where he also minored in music. Currently, Michael works at Cerner and holds a section leader position at St. Mary's Episcopal Church. He also regularly performs with Cardinalis, under the direction of Dr. Anthony Maglione. Michael is very excited to begin singing with Te Deum!

Kirsten Hyde is delighted to join Te Deum again for their Antiqua Series performance. She holds a bachelor's degree in vocal performance from Kansas State University where she performed in numerous operas and musicals. Kirsten is proud to be a part of the rich choral tradition of Kansas City as a singer and vice chairperson for KC VI-TAs and as a founding member of Ignea Strata, a vocal quartet hailed as Kansas City's answer to the Anonymous 4. Recently, Kirsten portrayed Woman 1 in Songs for A New World and looks forward to portraying Cathy in The Last 5 Years this fall. During the day she works as an event coordinator for Cerner Corporation.

Jeff Jasperson is elated to be a member of Te Deum for his first season! Jeff graduated from the University of Kansas in 2013 with a Bachelor of Arts in Music, voice emphasis. At KU, he performed with numerous choirs and was a four-year member of the KU Marching Jayhawks as a trumpet player. Since 2017, Jeff has been a director of the choral variety show Encore at Free State High School in Lawrence. He also works as a paraeducator at Shawnee Mission North High School. Jeff and his fiancée Kayla recently moved from Lawrence to downtown Kansas City and are loving it. In his spare time, Jeff enjoys singing and playing guitar at open mics, distance running, watching the Jayhawks, Chiefs, Royals, and Sporting KC, and attempting to win his fantasy football league.

Victoria Olson received her Bachelor of Music from the University of Nebraska at Omaha and recently completed her Master of Music and Artist Certificate with an emphasis in Baroque studies at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance. She has been an active collaborator in numerous concerts, large-scale projects, and recitals with ensembles such as Te Deum, Antiqua, Kantorei, Spire, and Missouri Choral Artists. In addition to vocal studies, Victoria holds a strong interest in music education and has served as a clinician, adjudicator, and private voice instructor across the Midwest. She is a versatile artist with experience in both traditional and new music, specializing in the Baroque era with a particular interest in cantatas, oratorios, and works for small chamber ensembles. Her performance career has taken her through the Midwest to Eastern Europe as a prominently featured soloist for major choral works in two opera houses.

Sarah Powers is a Kansas City native. She holds a Bachelor of Science in vocal performance from William Jewell College where she studied voice as a Choral Scholar. While working toward her degree, she studied privately with Sarah Tannehill Anderson and sang in the Concert Choir and Schola Cantorum. In the spring of her junior year, she appeared as a featured soloist with the Liberty Symphony Orchestra after winning the William Jewell Collegiate Artist Competition. Sarah has performed chorally and as a soloist with Musica Vocale, AGO Schola Cantorum, Cardinalis, and Te Deum Antiqua, and is currently seated as a choral scholar at St. Mary's Episcopal Church. In 2014, she participated in the Baroque Vocal Programme as part of the Vancouver Early Music Festival, and in 2016 she appeared as a soloist for Elijah under the direction of Don Neuen. Sarah is elated to continue singing with Antiqua!

Colin Riley is excited to join Te Deum for his first season. A recent arrival from Upstate New York, Colin performed with the nationally recognized chamber choir Ensemble Companio from 2014 to 2019 – serving as a tenor, officer, and board member. Colin graduated from Cornell University in 2009 with a Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering. While there, he sang with the Cornell University Glee Club under Scott Tucker, with performances including *Ein Deutsches Requiem* in Beijing, Shanghai, and Hong Kong; the 2009 American Choral Directors Association National Convention; and a stage production of Leonard Bernstein's *Mass.* Colin is a Senior Engineer with General Electric and also holds a Master of Science in Mechanical Engineering from Georgia Tech and a Master of Business Administration from Clarkson University. Colin lives in Overland Park and spends weekends visiting museums with his wife and daughter.

Sydney Seratte has been a member of Te Deum for not one, not two, but seven seasons! Sydney teaches music at Citizens of the World Charter School in Kansas City, Missouri. Prior to joining the team at CWC, she taught music at Bluejacket-Flint Elementary School in Shawnee, Kansas. She graduated with a Bachelor of Music Education from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance. As a UMKC student, Sydney enjoyed singing in university choirs and vocal recitals. Her teachers have included Janeal Krehbiel, Cathy Crispino, Dr. Charles Robinson, Dr. Ryan Board, Dr. Aidan Soder, Corbin Trimble, Debra Raffety, Robert Relly, Joan Hildebrand, and Patrice Sollenberger. Sydney teaches Simply Music piano lessons in the metro area, holds a master's degree in education from UMKC. She loves midtown Kansas City, house plants, vegetarian food and her two (too many) cats, Del and Meret.
